

The high school library consists of a large reading room, two library classrooms and a periodical room in addition to the librarian's office and workroom. The books, periodicals, and reference tools are used by teachers and students for recreational and inspirational reading as well as for information and research. Eight student assistants help the librarians keep our library attractive as well as functional.

A cafeteria and a band hall were added to our campus in 1945. The band hall is the home of our famous Eagle band that for 21 consecutive years has won a special award in Interscholastic League concert and sight reading. Since 1935, our band has been under the direction of Dr. Stuchbery.

On the first floor you'll find mathematics classes in full swing. Our curriculum provides forty-three math classes for our high school students. To the state regulations that students take at least two years of math, our school adds the requirement that all of our seniors must take a math course.

The math curriculum is designed to aid those who terminate their formal schooling at the end of high school by providing specific courses for this goal; it also provides a continuous course in pure math for those who plan to enter college or have special aptitudes or special abilities.

The second floor of the Vocational Building houses our commercial department.

All of these courses are elective, but our records show that slightly more than half of our students are enrolled in some commercial subject.

There are available to our students nineteen classes of typing, six classes of stenography, four classes of business machines, four classes of bookkeeping, three classes of commercial arithmetic, two classes of commercial spelling, and one each of commercial law and office practice.



Down the long hall on the north side of the Vocational Building's first floor, you will find our special vocational training classes.

Here six classes of mechanical drawing and six classes of woodshop are open to our students.

In our general metal shop our boys are taught basic skills and technical knowledge of major metal working trades. This course takes three hours a day and a boy may take two years of metal shop.

In the radio and electrical shop boys are taught to build and repair radio sets, repair electrical appliances and motors, and to wire the interior of homes. Repair and maintenance of television are also part of the program. Two years of this course are offered.

In the automobile mechanics shop, the boys are taught to repair all makes of modern automobiles. Students are allowed to work on their own or family cars. This course, too, may be taken for two years.

In the distributive education program, business firms of the community cooperate with the school by providing part time employment which serves as a laboratory for applying the instruction given these students in the classroom.

Boys at P. H. S. can learn the technical knowledge of vocational agricultures in the classrooms of our Ag Building erected in 1952. They then apply this knowledge to practical farm projects at home.





Our science program has been developed around the idea of stimulating interest in the scientific field without sacrificing the fundamental principals of science.






Both the girls and the teachers enjoy using the modern facilities which give relaxation while participating in sports.

The Gym is not only used during the day, but also for parties and other activities after school hours.


The clinic is also in the Gym where Mrs. Roberts tends the ails and illnesses of the school kids.




