




F R O S H T E R U S




Derek Munz and Sandy Zamarron were chosen as freshman class favorites.







Senior Mike Kastensmidt considered a freshman to be, "One who is going through a necessary phase change in the process of human development."


Senior Amy Bauser encouragingly added that, "A freshman is a senior in the making."

Remembering the time of his own disillusionment, senior Paul Flores pointed out that a freshman was, "Someone who still believes in Santa Claus."


Perhaps sophomore Dana Havard described them best when she said, "Freshmen are people who make honest mistakes which make them appear foolish."


