Derek Munz and Sandy Zamarron were chosen as freshman class favorites.

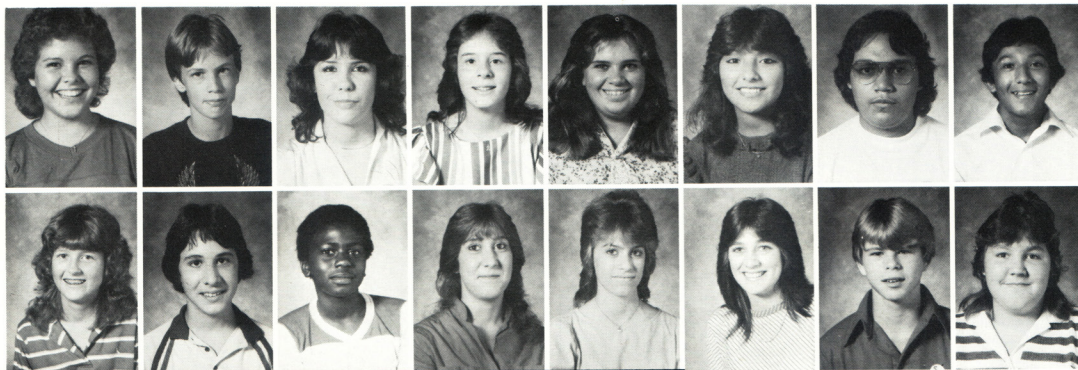

according to several freshmen. "It was so easy that it was pathetic," said Anthony Mirenda.

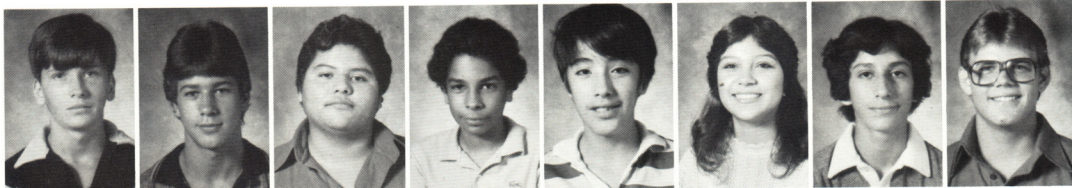
In late spring, results from the testing were returned to the local school districts; parents received individual student results at the close of the school year.

Senior Sheela Shankar jokingly called a 'Fish,' "The lowest being on the totem pole."

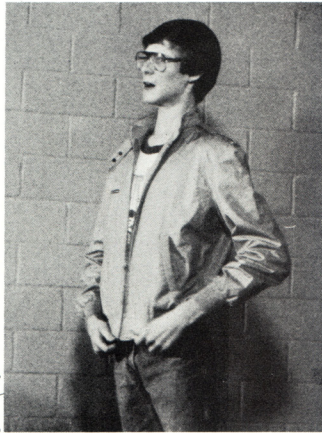

Remembering the time of his own disillusionment, senior Paul Flores pointed out that a freshman was, "Someone who still believes in Santa Claus."

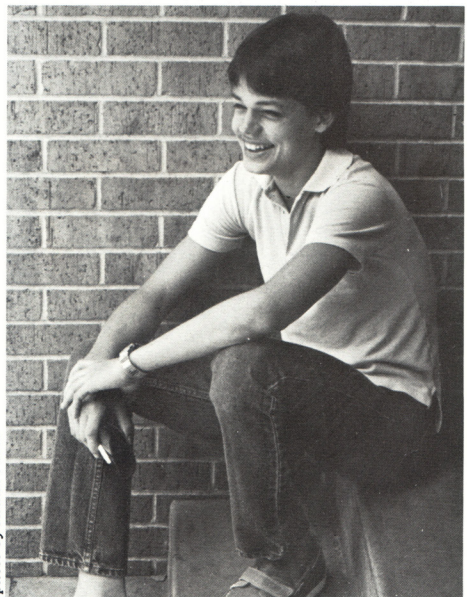
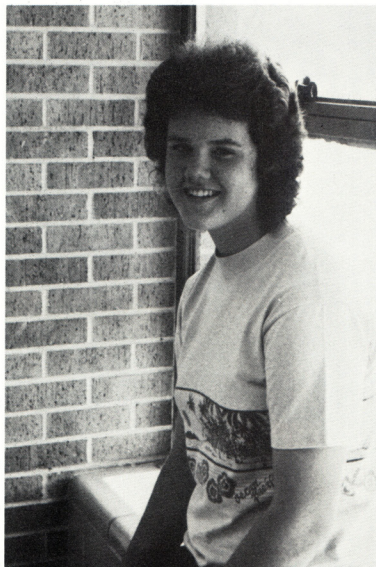
