Travel to Keystone, Thompson Intermediate has attended the Keystone School for the past

twenty-one years. We once again have the opportunity to attend this Colorado exceptional program on October 4-10, 2014. Our school would like to send up to 44 8th graders. The cost for the trip is approximately \$1000.00 depending on airline prices and is paid for by the students themselves. One scholarship will be available for a student that meets the requirements and will allow the student to attend for half price. The students are involved in educational activities from 8:00 a.m. until 9:00 p.m. each day. There is no television and no radio. Students are encouraged to interact with one another on a personal basis. Activities include daily hiking that presents activities for learning about mountain life zones, environmental concerns like drought and wildfires. adaptations of animals, food webs and interdependency of all factors in an environment and many of the essential elements prescribed for 7th and 8th grade science. Students learn through hands-on and real-life experiences throughout the trip. Every student that has attended in the past has gained a vast amount of knowledge and life skills from this experience.

Approximately 44 students will travel with 7 chaperones and 1 administrator. All chaperones will be trained in school district policy regarding responsibilities and duties prior to the trip. All rules of conduct established by the school district will be strictly enforced.

Financial Implications: The trip would be funded by the students and parents according to district policies. The cost will be approximately \$1000 per student. Students needing additional assistance may apply for scholarships.

Dr. Lewis responded that for high school it averages about 50.

Mr. Bailey stated that it must be longer routes.

Dr. Lewis replied that there will be longer routes because of the mid-day traffic when all the other buses are being used. The 50 may be a little high because some students will drive themselves. We always need buses in the regular fleet so they will not be wasted.

Mr. Kendrick inquired if the smaller buses would be used for the short trips back and forth to home campuses.

Dr. McCarley answered that it is taken into consideration depending upon the number of students and also the number of buses.

Mr. Speer questioned the possibility of having a "Caution Bus Entrance" sign on freeway.

Dr. Lewis replied that TX Dot has not been very cooperative so far.

Mr. Fred suggested a school zone.

Dr. McCarley shared that school zones have been requested many times for high schools but the City does not allow them.

Mrs. Quijano-Lerma questioned if students would have to sign up for bus service.

Dr. McCarley pointed out that bus service would automatically be provided. There will be routes through all the various neighborhoods for students.

Mrs. Morgan stated that it would seem that this would be part of the application process. I wonder how many students would take advantage of the bus or if parents would drop them off?

Dr. Powell clarified that the application does ask if the student would most often take the bus or be brought and picked up by family/friends.

Dr. Lewis stated that we really won't know until school starts and we get a pattern developed. There is a very good possibility that routes will end up being consolidated and buses moved to other routes and the opportunity for some new buses replacing some older buses.

Mr. Kendrick inquired if the entrance to the school will be off the Beltway or Allen Genoa.

Stewart Campbell, of Bay-IBI Architects, commented that the majority of the buses will come in off Allen Genoa. We are trying to stay off the Beltway all

together.

Dr. Lewis shared that we have made a request with the County and City of Houston to look at Grayson Rd. as an improvement project. We don't yet have an answer but the County has expressed a willingness to look at short road lengths with some level of improvement. At the very least, I've asked them to maintain the ditches so we can get that cleaned up and looking better and be safer for the students who might end up using Grayson as an alternate entrance.

School #7 Project, Based on enrollment projections, particularly in the South Belt area (Dobie and Fund Balance attendance zone), the District's ability to serve students will require the construction of a new High School designed for 2,000 students, with a capability for future expansion. A site consisting of 34 acres has been obtained at 5351 S. Shaver Street. Houston Texas.

The overall budget for the project has been established at \$77,299,200 consisting of a school of 384,000 square feet at an estimated cost of \$165 per square foot, and all necessary site work and improvements. The construction budget is \$63,360,000. It is essential to begin design now, in order to meet a projected completion date of April 30, 2017. Fees have been established based on estimates of construction cost (6.3%). Bay-IBI Group Architects is recommended as the architect for High School #7.

The Facilities and Construction Department is requesting approval by the Board of Trustees of the following portions of the project:

TOTAL BUDGET: \$77,299,200

CONSTRUCTION BUDGET: \$63,360,000

TOTAL DESIGN SERVICES: \$ 3,991,680 (6.3 % of Estimated Construction Cost)

50% DESIGN SERVICES: \$ 1,995,840 (50% of design fees anticipated prior to bond funding)

Funding of 50% design services, for a total of \$1,995,840, will be by the Fund Balance, and reimbursed by Bond Funds.

We recommend that the Board of Trustees approve a total project budget in the amount of \$77,299,200, and agreement for the design of High School #7 to Bay-IBI Group Architects at 6.3% of the estimated construction cost. 50% of design services totaling \$1,995,840 to be paid by Fund Balance.

Mr. Roberts asked how many students we were thinking about for this campus.

Dr. Lewis responded that we are recommending it be built for 2000 but open with approximately 1700.

Mr. Roberts inquired if this would be a 4A or 5A school, what schools it would pull from and how many.

Dr. Lewis replied that today it would be a 4A high school. Since everything is going up a notch next year it would be considered a 5A but equivalent to a 4A. It would pull from Dobie High, South Houston High, and Memorial High. It would take about 300 from South Houston High, 400 from Dobie High, and 400 from Memorial High.

Mr. Roberts questioned the numbers of students being pulled to go to CTHS.

Dr. Lewis explained that there would be 100 per grade level from each school. We knew we would have to limit enrollment at CTHS.

Mr. Roberts asked if the students taken from Memorial High would be those on 45 and Edgebrook.

Dr. Lewis responded that it would be the students in the Hwy 3/45 corridor.

Mr. Roberts asked if those students might go to South Houston High feeder school, then to Memorial High, and before graduating they might be given the option to move to the new High School #7.

Dr. Lewis replied that, if the new high school were approved and the money secured in a future bond, it would be three years from this coming Fall before we would be able to open that facility.

Mr. Roberts inquired if we had considered re-districting.

Dr. Lewis replied that they do not think a massive re-districting is in the best interest of the students.

Mr. Roberts asked about the enrollment at Dobie at this time.

Mr. Kendrick inquired what they would like the Dobie enrollment to be.

Dr. Lewis answered that it is now 3700 plus and the preferred enrollment would be 2800. Because of the growth in the area it will never get to that number. If we can get the enrollment to 3000-3300 I believe we are probably in as good a shape as we can get it. If the projected number develop as it now looks, they will have an enrollment of 4000 within the next 3-4 years. That is just too high.

Mr. Roberts inquired about adding onto Memorial.

Dr. Lewis pointed out that they already are at 2800 students and projected to grow to 3100 over the next couple of years. We could add another wing but I don't want that campus to get that large either. I think it is better academically and safety wise for the students.

Mr. Roberts asked if we have ever approved a drawing of this magnitude before a bond was passed.

Dr. Lewis replied that he thinks we have done a small elementary project but nothing of this magnitude.

Mr. Roberts asked if we pay \$2 million for this design and the bond doesn't

pass, what will happen to the design.

Dr. Lewis remarked that the design would go on the shelf and if we ever needed it in the future we would have it to pull and use.

Mr. Roberts asked if we have built a high school on 35 acres in the recent past. The number has always been 50 acres in the past.

Dr. Lewis replied that we have not, although PHS was probably originally that size. We are looking at buying additional property adjacent to this site that would give us 50 acres.

Mrs. Sullivan inquired on why we would limit ourselves to 2000 students at this cost.

Dr. Lewis explained that the plan, because of the high poverty in this zone, is to keep it small with around 1700 and not over 2000. The campus will need more of a personal touch and personal relationship building. I would also like to get at least South Houston High down to a 4A campus so we can serve those students a bit better. This one, by academic design, needs to remain small. We want to make sure that whatever we design is designed with the ability to expand, but my hope would be to maintain it at 1700-2000.

Mrs. Sullivan commented that the completion of Hall Rd. would bring in more homes in the Dobie area and eventually there would need to be a boundary change.

Dr. Lewis explained that PHS is the only place with room at this point. South Houston High and Memorial are maxed out. If we did a boundary change without building a new campus we are looking at a domino effect across the district of shifting kids from one place to the other.

Mrs. Morgan asked if we have looked into the numbers that the Hall Rd. extension would bring to the district.

Dr. Lewis explained that this area has 1500 acres to develop. This is what is triggering the projections in the Dobie area in the future.

Mr. Kendrick inquired on the projections for 2017.

Dr. Lewis explained that, if the homes materialize, the estimated enrollment for the district would be between 59,000 and 60,000. We are at 54,500 now.

Mr. Bailey remarked that it sounds like we need to be planning to buy real estate to go with this school.

	Mrs. Sullivan asked if we could wait to see if we are able to purchase the land to then build a larger high school that would even them all out and make them smaller.
	Mr. Kendrick replied that they wanted to keep it between 1700-2000 enrollment.
	Dr. Lewis explained that we could balance enrollment a little more but that would mean taking more students from Dobie and this would lose the South Belt support. I do recognize it is unusual to ask for design work to be done before a bond is approved. If we wait until the bond is passed we are looking at November as a possible election date. We then are 3 years from the opening and that means it is 2018. By then Dobie is projected to have an enrollment of 4200-4300.
	Mr. Kendrick inquired on the problem of reducing the numbers at Dobie.
	Dr. Lewis responded that he believes it is a very cohesive, traditional neighborhood and we need to respect that. What we can do is take everything north of Fuqua and the Sycamore Valley area and the Hwy 3 corridor to the south and bring those up together to the new campus. You would be taking almost 400 kids from Dobie by doing this.
	Mrs. Sullivan questioned if the Dobie and Memorial design could be used for the new school.
	Dr. Lewis responded that it could but they are both larger than the plans for this new high school.

SUBJECT: Consideration and Possible Approval of 2014-2015 Student Code of Conduct BACKGROUND: Suggestions for revisions to the Student Code of Conduct were solicited from all District administrators. All principals and assistant principals were asked to seek input from their faculties, staff and site-based decision making committees. As mandated, the recommendations generated through this collaborative process were compiled and reviewed by members of the District Education Committee (D.E.C.) on February 13, 2014. Each campus has a representative on D.E.C., and the membership includes principals, assistant principals, teachers and parents. For this special task each year, one student representative from each high school, as well as a member of the Board of Trustees, are invited to participate. Members of D.E.C. reached consensus on revisions to be included in the 2014-2015 Student Code of Conduct. In addition, all campus principals had an opportunity to approve or reject the D.E.C. revisions. The District's legal counsel has reviewed and approved all of these changes. Sergeant Mario Saldivar of the PISD Police Department reviewed the current list of prohibited gang-related items which must be displayed with the Student Code of Conduct on each campus. No revisions were made. The current list has been included for information only. Overview

Community Involvement

Representatives from all segments of the local education community were involved in developing and reviewing the District's Student Code of Conduct (the "Code"). Selected teachers, administrators, students, and parents reviewed and reacted to the Code.

Rights and Responsibilities of Parents

Throughout this Code, "parents" includes a natural parent, adoptive parent, legal guardian, or person having lawful control of the student.

Each parent or guardian is entitled to enjoy the basic rights of citizenship recognized and protected by federal, state and local law and District policy. District schools shall foster a climate of mutual respect for the rights and privileges of others. Each parent is expected to respect and protect the rights and privileges of students, teachers, District staff and other parents. Parents are expected to use appropriate behavior on school campuses and at school-related activities. Parents who violate the rights of others may be subject to District action which may include civil or criminal prosecution as outlined by law and/or District policy.

Parents have the responsibility to:

- 1. Make every effort to provide for the physical needs of the child.
- 2. Instruct the child to pay attention and obey the rules.
- 3. Be sure their child attends school regularly and promptly report and explain absences and tardies to the school.
- 4. Encourage and lead the child to develop proper study habits at home.
- 5. Participate in meaningful parent-teacher and/or parent-teacher-principal conferences to discuss their child's school progress and welfare.
- 6. Attend parent training workshops for home reinforcement of study skills and specific curriculum objectives. The availability of parent training workshops for home reinforcement of study skills and specific curriculum objectives shall be dependent upon significant interest expressed by parents in the community.
- 7. Keep informed of school policies and academic requirements of school programs.
- 8. Participate in school-related organizations.
- 9. Be sure their child is appropriately dressed at school and school-related activities. Students must conform to the designated standardized dress approved by the school board.
- 10. Be sure their child does not bring to school toys, radios, telecommunication devices or other inappropriate items that may interfere with the learning environment or violate the District's policies or Student Code of Conduct.
- 11. Discuss report cards and school assignments with their child.
- 12. Bring to the attention of school authorities any learning problem or condition that may relate to their child's education.
- 13. Maintain up-to-date home address, as well as home, work, and emergency telephone numbers, and other pertinent information at the school.
- 14. Cooperate with school administrators and teachers.
- 15. Be sure their child attends school tutorials when required or as the need arises.
- 16. Be sure that their child is brought to school and picked up from school at appropriate times to ensure the availability of adequate supervision for the child.
- 17. Secure a visitor's permit from the school office when on campus during regular instructional hours, and surrender that visitor's permit upon departure. All adults or parents are required to have a picture ID while on school property.
- 18. Submit signed statements that they have received, understand and consent to the responsibilities outlined in both the Student Code of Conduct and the Student Handbook.
- 19. Control their child. Under Family Code 41.001, a student's parent is legally liable for property damage proximately caused by a) the negligent conduct of the student, if such conduct is reasonably attributable to the negligent failure of the parent to exercise that duty, or b) the willful or malicious conduct of a student who is at least 12 but under 18 years of age.
- 20. Realize that a parent's permission for a student to violate the school's regulations, or his/her approval of the violation after it has been done, does not legitimatize the action.
- 21. Use appropriate language when communicating with staff members on the school campus or during school-related activities.

The District has disciplinary authority over a student:

- 1. During the regular school day and while the student is going to and from school on district transportation;
- 2. While the student is in attendance at any school-related activity, regardless of time or location;
- 3. For any school-related misconduct, regardless of time or location;
- 4. When retaliation against a school employee or volunteer occurs or is threatened, regardless of time or location;
- 5. When criminal mischief is committed on or off school property or at a school-related event;
- 6. For certain offenses committed within 300 feet of school property as measured from any point on the school's real property boundary line;
- 7. For certain offenses committed while on school property or while attending a school-sponsored or school-related activity of another district in Texas;
- 8. When the student commits a felony, as provided by Education Code 37.006 or 37.0081; and
- 9. When the student is required to register as a sex offender.

Unless indicated specifically in this Code, the District's jurisdiction does not extend to students as they go to and from school. It is the parent's responsibility to assure their child's safety as they travel to and from school.

Dress Code

The Pasadena Independent School District has established the following standardized dress code for students.

<u>Shirts</u>

Shirts may be any color. Logos are allowed just as prints, pictures, stripes and plaids are allowed. Logos shall not reference death, sex, drugs, alcohol, gangs or weapons. Shirts shall be either a collared "polo style" or collared "oxford style" shirt appropriately sized with sleeves and free of inappropriate designs which include, but are not limited to, those related to death, sex, drugs, alcohol, gangs or weapons. Turtlenecks and T-shirts may be worn underneath the standardized shirt and shall be appropriately sized and free of inappropriate designs which include, but are not limited to, those related to death, sex, drugs, alcohol, gangs or weapons. Shirts must remain tucked in at all times.

Pants and/or Jeans

Pants and/or jeans may be any solid color. Color and design restrictions apply to Pants and/or jeans which shall be either solid colors of khaki, navy, black, brown or gray, free of design and hemmed. Pants/Jeans must meet the following additional criteria:

- All pants/jeans must be appropriately sized, fitted and worn at the waist. No hip huggers are allowed.
- All pants/jeans must be fitted in the crotch and legs, not baggy or excessively tight. Pants/jeans with hammer loops or of a cargo style are not permitted. Pockets on pants/jeans are acceptable at the waistline only.
- All pants/jeans must be of proper length and must not touch the floor.
- All pants/jeans must be free of slits.
- All pants/jeans must be one continuous solid color free of manufactured fading or bleaching.
- Pants/jeans must be free of holes or tears.
- Undergarments must not be visible through pants/jeans.

<u>Skirts and/or Jumpers</u> shall be either solid khaki, navy, black, brown or gray, may be any solid color and must be free of design and hemmed. Skirts and/or jumpers shall be worn by female students only. Skirts and/or jumpers must meet the following additional criteria:

- All skirts/jumpers must be appropriately sized, not baggy or excessively tight.
- All skirts must be fitted and worn at the waist. No hip hugger skirts are allowed.
- Manufacturer slits on jumpers/skirts can come no higher than 2 inches above the kneecap.
- All skirts/jumpers must be free of manufactured fading or bleaching.
- All skirts/jumpers must be free of holes and tears.
- The hem length of all skirts and/or jumpers must be no higher than 2 inches above the kneecap.
- Undergarments must not be visible through skirts/jumpers.

Shorts/Skorts/Capri Pants

Secondary Schools Grades 6-12 (including Grades 5 and 6 in Middle Schools)

No shorts/skorts or capri pants will be allowed.

Elementary Schools Grades PK-5 (excluding Grade 5 in Middle Schools)

Shorts/skorts shall be either solid khaki, navy, black, brown or gray, may be any solid color and shall be free of design, hemmed, appropriately sized, and the length must be no higher than 2 inches above the kneecap. Undergarments must not be visible through shorts/skorts. Solid color blue, khaki, black, brown or gray Denim shorts/skorts of any solid color, free of design, appropriately sized and no higher than 2 inches above the kneecap are permitted. Shorts with hammer loops or of a cargo style are not permitted. Pockets on shorts/skorts are permitted at the waistline only. Capri pants are permitted as long as they meet all criteria listed under the Pants and/or Jeans section. Elementary students will participate in physical education activities with the clothes they wear to school.

Belts are required for garments made with belt loops in grades 3 through 12. Belts should be securely fastened at all times.

Spirit/D.A.R.E. Shirts may be worn on days designated by the campus principal. Girl Scout and Boy Scout uniforms are appropriate at any time.

<u>Shoes</u> – Students must wear shoes with backs that are appropriate for school. (Students participating in physical education activities must have appropriate shoes.) Skate shoes are not permitted. Shoes must be securely fastened at all times with shoe straps velcroed and/or shoelaces tied. Shoes with laces or velcro straps must be securely fastened at all times.

Sweaters/Sweat Shirts/Light Jackets/Hoodies

Sweaters/sweat shirts/light jackets/hoodies of any color may be worn over the "polo style" or "oxford style" standardized dress shirt. The collar of the standardized shirt must be visible at all times. Sweaters/sweat shirts/light jackets/hoodies shall be appropriately sized and free of inappropriate designs which include, but are not limited to, those related to death, sex, drugs, alcohol, gangs or weapons. Campus letter jackets or light jackets with an approved campus-specific logo are permissible.

Coats/Jackets

Secondary Schools Grades 6-12 (including Grades 5 and 6 in Middle Schools)

Coats may be worn to a secondary campus provided they are placed in the student's locker or designated storage area upon arrival and not removed until the conclusion of the school day.

Elementary Schools Grades PK-5 (excluding Grade 5 in Middle Schools)

Coats or jackets worn by elementary students will be placed in an area designated by the teacher upon arrival to the campus, and the coats/jackets will remain in this area while students are in the classroom.

All other rules and regulations, as defined in the Student Code of Conduct, regarding dress and grooming shall apply.

The principal and assistant principal(s) are authorized to make determinations regarding whether any fashion, fad, hair, jewelry or article of clothing is inappropriate for school wear or disruptive to the educational process or safety of the campus.

In addition, the following standards of student dress and grooming shall be maintained.

- 1. Hair must be neat, clean, well groomed, and may not have shaved designs.
- 2. No type of head covering, cap or hat (such as bandannas, sweatbands, etc.) may be worn on campus. No hair rollers or long-handled combs may be worn on campus.
- 3. Sideburns must be kept neatly trimmed and must not extend below ear level or flare at the bottom.
- 4. Symbols and/or styles which are identified with gang membership or representation shall not be allowed. A list of prohibited symbols and/or styles is posted next to the Student Code of Conduct in the principal's office. Students are responsible for reviewing the posted list to determine prohibited symbols and/or dress styles.
- 5. Mustaches and beards are prohibited, and faces must be clean-shaven.
- 6. Shirts and blouses must be buttoned within one button of the throat.
- 7. Halter tops and shirts or blouses with plunging necklines are prohibited. Tanktops or undershirts worn as outer garments are also prohibited. The midriff must not be exposed when the student goes through the normal activities of a school day (bending, stretching etc.).

- 8. Articles of clothing, garments, make-up and accessories with inappropriate decorations or advertisements are prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, any item that depicts the occult, gang membership, death, suicide, violence, drugs or alcohol.
- 9. Students at elementary school campuses may not use any type of cosmetics, including, but not limited to, mascara and artificial nails. Nail polish is acceptable.
- 10. Revealing or excessively tight garments are prohibited. Appropriate foundation garments and/or undergarments must be worn.
- 11. Pants or shorts may not be worn in any way that reflects gang affiliation or conceals contraband.
- 12. Shirts and blouses shall be appropriately sized and may not be worn in any way that reflects gang affiliation or conceals contraband. Shirts, designed to be worn inside the waistband, must be tucked into pants, shorts or skirts. (See posted list in main campus office for gang affiliated attire.)
- 13. Patterned contact lenses are prohibited.

EARRINGS/BODY PIERCING	Males are not permitted to wear earrings of any type. Students are not permitted to wear other non-traditional rings (nose, lip, etc.). Students are not allowed to wear gauges or other devices to expand the earlobe. Clips, posts, and/or other devices designed to prevent the piercing area from closing are not permitted. Elementary students may not wear more than two earrings in each earlobe. Earrings larger than 1" in diameter or length are prohibited for elementary students.	
TATTOOS	All tattoos must be appropriately covered.	
BADGES	Student identification badges are <u>required in high schools</u> and may be required by intermediate schools. Badges shall be replaced at the expense of the student if the badge is lost, stolen, broken, deformed, or distorted. The campus principal will specify when and how the badge is to be displayed.	
VIOLATIONS	When a student's dress or grooming violates the guidelines provided herein, the principal shall request that the student make corrections and may take appropriate disciplinary action. If the problem is not corrected, the student may be assigned in-school suspension for the remainder of the day or until the problem is corrected. Repeated dress code offenses may result in more serious disciplinary action.	
MEDICAL EXCEPTIONS	The principal, associate superintendent for campus development, or superintendent may grant an exception to any of the above provisions if a student has a physical or medical condition rendering compliance with the provisions detrimental to the student's physical health.	
INTERPRETATION OF APPROPRIATENESS	The principal and assistant principal(s) are authorized to make determinations regarding whether any fashion, fad, hair, jewelry or article of clothing is inappropriate for school wear or disruptive to the educational process or safety of the campus.	
EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES	The principal and the sponsor, coach, or other person in charge of an extracurricular activity may regulate the dress and grooming of the students participating in or attending the activity.	
GUIDANCE CENTER	Students assigned to the Guidance Center are to follow the district-wide dress code policy as designated by the Pasadena ISD Student Code of Conduct.	

Book Bags, Back Packs and Purses

Book bags and back packs may be prohibited on any secondary campus under the authority of the campus principal. The campus principal may permit clear, transparent or mesh book bags or back packs on campus provided the items are placed in the student's locker upon arrival and not removed until the conclusion of the school day. The principal may require clear or transparent back packs only. Purses in excess of 8" x 10", satchels and briefcases shall be prohibited. Purses may not be worn as backpacks.

Elementary students shall be permitted to bring back packs and book bags to school. The principal may require clear, transparent or mesh back packs only.

Offenses to Property

1. Students are prohibited from vandalizing or otherwise damaging or defacing any personal property belonging to, rented by, or used by the District or District personnel. Students or parents will be responsible for making restitution.

Harassment is:

(1) Conduct that meets the definition established in District policies DIA (LOCAL) and FFH (LOCAL) (see also sexual harassment as further defined below); or

(2) Conduct that threatens to cause harm or bodily injury to another student, is sexually intimidating, causes physical damage to the property of another student, subjects another student to physical confinement or restraint, or maliciously and substantially harms another student's physical or emotional health or safety.

Hazing: Hazing means any intentional, knowing or reckless act, occurring on or off campus, by one person alone or acting with others, directed against a student, that endangers the mental or physical health or the safety of a student for the purpose of pledging, being initiated into, affiliating with, holding office in, or maintaining membership in any organization whose members are or include other students. (Texas Education Code §37.151) The term includes but is not limited to:

- 1. Any type of physical brutality, such as whipping, beating, striking, branding, electronic shocking, placing of a harmful substance on the body, or similar activity.
- 2. Any type of physical activity, such as sleep deprivation, exposure to the elements, confinement in a small space, calisthenics or other activity that subjects the student to an unreasonable risk of harm or that adversely affects the mental or physical health or the safety of the student.
- 3. Any activity involving consumption of a food, liquid, alcoholic beverage, liquor, drug or other substance that subjects the student to an unreasonable risk of harm or that adversely affects the mental or physical health or the safety of the student.
- 4. Any activity that intimidates or threatens the student with ostracism, that subjects the student to extreme mental stress, shame, or humiliation, or that adversely affects the mental health or dignity of the student or discourages the student from entering or remaining registered in a District school, or that may reasonably be expected to cause a student to leave the organization or the school rather than submit to acts described above.
- 5. Any activity that induces, causes or requires the student to perform a duty or task that involves a violation of the Penal Code.

Students shall have prior approval from the principal or designee for any type of "initiation rites" of a school club or organization. No student shall engage in any form of hazing, nor shall any student encourage or assist any other person in hazing. Acts of hazing and failure to report known hazing or planned hazing can result in criminal penalties, as well as school discipline.

Hit List is a list of people targeted to be harmed, using a firearm, a knife, or any other object to be used with intent to cause bodily harm.

Sexual Harassment: - Definition: Offensive and unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature directed toward a student or other person or offensive and unwelcome conduct aimed at another solely because of his or her gender or sexual orientation. This definition also includes conduct that meets any sexually related definition established in District policies DIA (LOCAL) and FFH (LOCAL).

If a student believes he or she has been sexually harassed, the student or the student's parents should report the incident to the principal, other appropriate supervising administrator, or the Title IX Coordinator at (713) 740-0247.

If a student's conduct is offensive and unwelcome, the campus will determine if the conduct should be punished in accordance with this Student Code of Conduct.

Dating Violence occurs when a person in a current or past dating relationship uses physical, sexual, verbal, or emotional abuse to harm, threaten, intimidate, or control another person in the relationship. Dating violence also occurs when a person commits these acts against a person in a marriage or dating relationship with the individual who is or was once in a marriage or dating relationship with the person committing the offense, as defined by Section 71.0021, Family Code.

Tobacco Use: Students in all grades shall not possess or use tobacco products, including but not limited to cigarettes, electronic cigarettes, cigars, pipes, snuff, or chewing tobacco, on school premises or at school-related functions. Students are forbidden to possess matches and/or lighters. Citations may be issued.

Drug/Alcohol Use: No student shall possess, use, transmit, or attempt to possess, use, or transmit, or be under the influence of any of the following substances on school premises during any school term or off school premises at a school-related activity:

- a. Any controlled substance or dangerous drug as defined by law, without regard to amount, including but not limited to marijuana, any narcotic drug, hallucinogen, stimulant, depressant, amphetamine, or barbiturate.
- b. Alcohol or any alcoholic beverage.
- c. Any abusable volatile chemical or any other substance for inhalation.
- d. Any other intoxicant, or mood-changing, mind-altering, or behavioral-altering drugs.

Guidance Center

The purpose of the Guidance Center is to provide services that help correct the problems that have interfered with a student's progress in school. The Center provides an off campus in-school suspension facility for placements shorter than 30 days for continuing educational progress.

A student assigned to the Guidance Center is prohibited from attending classes on the home campus or participating in any school-sponsored or school-related activity during their assignment. If this prohibition is violated, the student shall be given a citation for trespassing. Students who have been assigned to the Center are not to return to their home school before or after school hours for any meetings, rehearsals, or extra curricular activities while still attending the Center. This restriction will remain in effect until the morning of the first school day after completing the assignment, and until the student is properly re-admitted by the school.

The Guidance Center has two locations. All middle school, intermediate school and high school students, grades 5-12, will attend the Guidance Center located at 3010 Bayshore in Pasadena. This site is open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Class hours are 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. If you should have any questions regarding the secondary Guidance Center, please call (713) 740-0792.

The Elementary Guidance Center program is located at Fisher Elementary, 2920 Watters Road in Pasadena. The hours for this site are 8:15 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. If you have a question for this site, please call (713) 740-0552.

Students are counted present daily and receive full academic credit while at the Center unless assigned there pending an appeal of an expulsion, in which case, if the expulsion is upheld, the student may not receive credit for work completed at the Center. Failure to attend the Guidance Center as assigned is a violation of the state compulsory attendance laws.

Placement terms vary according to the severity of the disciplinary infraction. Failure to adhere to the rules may result in additional time being added to the student's assignment or other disciplinary action. If, after having been placed in the Center, the student continues to engage in serious or persistent misbehavior that violates the District's previously communicated written standards of student conduct, the student may be assigned to The Summit or expelled.

A student who fails to complete a Guidance Center assignment at the end of a school year may be required to complete the assignment at the beginning of the next school year. A student who fails to complete an assignment during the school year because of withdrawal from school shall complete the assignment upon re-enrollment in a Pasadena ISD school (unless the District can verify that the assignment was satisfied in an alternative setting outside the District).

Failure to attend the Guidance Center as assigned is a violation of the state compulsory attendance laws. The Center is centrally located within the District, and it is the student's and/or parent's responsibility to provide transportation.

Students are responsible for getting their school books and assignments and bringing them to the Center. Students are expected to complete assigned work with the assistance available from the Center teachers. It is the students' responsibility to satisfactorily complete all assignments and return them to their regular classroom teachers.

Students on free or reduced breakfasts and lunches will be provided with a breakfast and lunch, and others may purchase the meals. Intermediate and high school students eligible for free or reduced breakfasts and any other secondary student wishing to purchase breakfast must arrive by 7:30 a.m. should contact the Guidance Center at (713) 740-0792 regarding arrival time for breakfast. Elementary students must arrive by 7:50 a.m.

Disciplinary Alternative Education Program

Depending upon the nature of the offense and other factors listed on page 13 of this Code, if applicable, students who are removed to a DAEP shall be placed in The Summit.

Description of The Summit

This program is designed to serve secondary (grades 6-12) Pasadena School District students who have been:

• placed in a DAEP for serious misconduct, or for disciplinary alternative education program offenses, or who have been expelled and not placed in a Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program (JJAEP).

The Summit is the Disciplinary Alternative Education Program (DAEP) for the Pasadena Independent School District. This innovative program provides for each student's academic and behavioral needs during long-term disciplinary removals from his or her home campus. The Summit employs only teachers who meet all certification requirements established under TEC Chapter 21, Subchapter B; and provides not less than the minimum amount of instructional time per day as required by TEC 25.082(a).

Upon enrollment, in order to assess a student's academic growth during placement in the DAEP, the District shall administer to a student placed in a program for a period of 90 school days or longer an assessment instrument approved by

Serious Offenses

Examples:

- 1. Assaulting a teacher or other individual
- 2. Possess, use, give, deliver or sell paraphernalia related to any prohibited substance while on school property and/or at a school activity
- 3. Possession, solicitation, sale, delivery or use of any substance represented to be an illegal or prohibited substance, including but not limited to synthetic compounds and synthetic cannabinoids (K2, bath salts, etc.) (mandatory DAEP removal; may expel if incident occurs during DAEP placement)
- 4. Vandalism
- 5. Robbery or theft
- 6. Gang activity as outlined under Secret Societies/Gangs (defined on page 11)
- 7. Forgery
- 8. Extortion, coercion, or blackmail
- 9. Aggressive, disruptive action or group demonstration that substantially disrupts or materially interferes with school activities
- 10. Engaging in verbal abuse, i.e., name-calling, racial or ethnic slurs, or derogatory statements that school officials have reasonable cause to believe will substantially disrupt the school environment or incite violence
- 11. Failure to comply with directives given by school personnel (insubordination)
- 12. Exhibiting disrespect or directing profanity, vulgar language, obscene gestures or slanderous/libelous accusations toward teachers, school employees, and officials or other persons lawfully on school grounds or at school-related activities
- 13. Fighting, committing physical abuse or threatening physical abuse
- 14. Hacking and illegal or unauthorized entry or attempted entry into the District, student's or employee's computer systems, networks and/or files
- 15. Hazing (defined on page 8)
- 16. Fireworks (selling, giving, or delivering to another person, possessing or using while on school property and/or at a school activity) Shooting of fireworks of any kind or explosive devices in the building, on the campus, or at school-sponsored activities any time during the day or night is forbidden. Students shooting or possessing fireworks will be assigned to the Guidance Center or be given further severe disciplinary action. Appropriate legal action will also be taken.
- 17. Engaging in offensive conduct of a sexual nature (including sexual harassment), whether verbal or physical, which may include requests for sexual favors or other intimidating sexual conduct, directed toward an adult or another student
- 18. Engaging in conduct that constitutes dating violence, including the intentional use of physical, sexual, verbal, or emotional abuse to harm, threaten, intimidate, or control another person with whom the student has or has had a dating relationship
- 19. Possession of a personal protection device (i.e., pepper spray, stun gun, etc.)
- 20. Possession of live ammunition with or without intent to use
- 21. Failure of a student to abide by prescribed rules for possessing or using medication while at school
- 22. Persistent misbehavior in the form of repeated and continuing minor offenses
- 23. Possession of a weapon as defined on page 7 of the Student Code of Conduct (mandatory DAEP removal; may expel if incident occurs during DAEP placement)
- 24. The possession or use of articles generally not considered weapons may be prohibited when, in the judgment of school personnel, a reasonable apprehension of danger exists to the possessor, to others, or to school property by virtue of such possession or use (i.e., laser pointers, etc.)
- 25. Use or possession of tobacco, lighters or electronic cigarettes. Possession of tobacco is a ticketable offense by the PISD Police, and students are subject to a fine.
- 26. Gambling
- 27. Writing graffiti (using aerosol paint or an indelible marker) on the property of a school
- 28. Spectator fighting, obstructing or restricting the passage of school personnel to the scene of a physical confrontation OR failure to disperse from the scene of a physical confrontation
- 29. Loitering or trespassing
- 30. Under the influence (defined on page 9) of prescription or over-the-counter medication or an unidentified substance that causes impairment of the physical or mental faculties (mandatory DAEP removal; may expel if incident occurs during DAEP placement)
- 31. Accessing pornographic materials/pictures via internet

Appeal of Placement in a Disciplinary Alternative Education Program

If a student's removal to a disciplinary alternative education program extends beyond the end of the next grading period, the student is entitled to the following appeal process. If the student and/or parent or guardian disagrees with the outcome of the school-level conference at which the student was notified of the reasons and basis for the removal, a request for a hearing may be filed. The student and/or parent or guardian may appeal by filing a signed written notice within two (2) school days of receipt of that decision with the respective Associate Superintendent for Campus Development. A hearing on that appeal will be conducted before a Central Administration Hearing Committee within five (5) school days after the notice of the appeal is received unless scheduled at a later date by mutual consent of the parent and principal and/or due to the presence of legal counsel. The student may be represented by an adult representative the parent, guardian or legal counsel. If the District makes a good-faith effort to inform the student and the student's parent or guardian of the time and place of the hearing, the District may hold the hearing regardless of whether the student or the student's parent or guardian attends. The Central Administration Hearing Committee will be comprised of three (3) central office administrators chaired by a school district hearing officer. The Central Administration Hearing Committee will hear the appeal and render a decision in regards to the student's offense and the appropriate actions, if any, to be taken by the school district. Pending any level of appeal of a principal or designee's decision to remove a student to a disciplinary alternative education program, the student may be removed to the disciplinary alternative education program.

If the Hearing Committee's decision to remove a student to a disciplinary alternative educational setting is appealed, then the appeal shall be made in writing to the Superintendent within two (2) school days after the receipt of the written notice. The written appeal must contain:

- A detailed statement of the complaint and evidence in its support;
- The specific district policy or regulation involved in the complaint, if any;
- The specific remedy suggested by the parent or student; and the signature of the appealing party(ies).

Upon receipt of the written appeal, the matter will be placed on the Board agenda for consideration at the next meeting or other mutually-agreeable date. If the District makes a good-faith effort to inform the student and the student's parent or guardian of the time of the Board meeting at which the Board will consider the appeal, the Board may consider the appeal regardless of whether the student, the student's parent or guardian, or another adult representing the student attends. The Board shall base its decision solely on the record made at the appeal hearing conducted before the Hearing Committee. No new evidence may be presented before the Board. The student or his or her representative and the administration's representative may make arguments to the Board based on the record for time periods as set by the Board. The Board's decision is final and may not be appealed.

Sanctions During a Disciplinary Alternative Placement

Those students removed to a disciplinary alternative education program are prohibited from being on school grounds of their home campus, any school district property other than the DAEP (except by special permission), or attending school-related extracurricular activities during the period of removal. This restriction will remain in effect until the morning of the first school day after completing the assignment to a disciplinary alternative education program, and until the student is properly re-admitted by the school. Students assigned to The Summit may be enrolled in extended year and/or PISD Community School programs. Violations of the Code of Conduct may result in removal from these programs. The extended year program will serve students assigned to the DAEP in conjunction with other students.

Additional Conduct After Removal

If, during the term of placement, a student engages in additional conduct for which placement in a disciplinary alternative education program or expulsion is required or permitted, additional proceedings may be conducted regarding that conduct, and the principal or Board, as appropriate, may enter an additional order as a result of those proceedings.

Withdrawals

If a student withdraws from PISD before an order for placement in a disciplinary alternative education program is entered, the principal or Board, as appropriate, may complete the proceedings and enter an order. If the student subsequently enrolls in PISD during the same or subsequent school year, PISD may enforce the order at that time except for any period of the placement that has been served by the student on enrollment in another district that honored the order. If the principal or Board fails to enter an order after the student withdraws, the next district in which the student enrolls may complete the proceedings and enter an order. If the student withdraws after receiving verbal and/or written notice of removal to a disciplinary alternative education program, any decision regarding this placement may not be appealed.

PASADENA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT GANG-RELATED ITEMS

- The "*Houston Astro Baseball Star logo*" and "*Houston Downtown Skylines*" unless approved by school
- *"The Houston Texans logo", "Houston Oilers logo"* and *"Houston Rockets logo"* unless approved by school
- 5 Pointed Star with the letter "H" in it or on top of the star
- Number "13," "713," "281", "832", "52," "59", or three dots in a triangle formation
- Dice, an eight ball, spider webs, dog paw, or the letters "MOB"
- Confederate flag or swastika
- Satanic symbols such as pentagrams, devil's heads and skull rings, and any variation of the grim reaper
- Guns, bullets, knives, drugs or drug paraphernalia

SUBJECT:	Consideration and possible adoption of the graduation plan reflecting new state requirements to begin with students entering ninth grade in the 2014-2015 school year and thereafter.
BACKGROUND:	Pursuant to House Bill 5, Pasadena Independent School District students entering ninth grade in 2014-2015 and thereafter will enter under the Foundation High School Plan (FHSP) with a four year plan to earn an Endorsement with Distinguished Level of Achievement.
	Under the state Foundation High School Plan (FHSP) students must complete 22 credits: four credits of English Language Arts, three credits of Mathematics, three credits of Social Studies, three credits of Science, two credits of Foreign Language, one credit of Fine Arts, one credit of Physical Education, and five elective credits. The FHSP also requires students to successfully complete all testing requirements for graduation and demonstrate speech proficiency.
	All ninth grade students must begin high school enrolled in one of five endorsement paths. This requires completion of the 22 credit FHSP, a fourth math credit, a fourth science credit, and two additional elective credits for a total of 26 credits. A coherent sequence in a career pathway is required to complete an endorsement. After a students' sophomore year with principal and parent permission, a student may graduate under the FHSP without earning an endorsement.
	To earn the Distinguished Level of Achievement a student must complete the FHSP with an endorsement and complete Algebra II as one of the advanced math credits. Graduates in the top 10% of their class who earn the Distinguished Level of Achievement gain automatic admission into state universities.

SUBJECT:Consideration and possible approval of the PasadenaISD Extended Year Programs for Summer 2014

BACKGROUND: Extended Year will be held at eleven elementary, two middle, two intermediate, two high school locations, Summit, and Community School. Free bus transportation, free universal breakfast, and free universal lunch will be provided for all students at all extended year locations.

Extended Year Programs – High School

The extended year high school program will be held at Dobie High School, Pasadena High Schools, and The Summit. The program will consist of initial credit, credit recovery, STAAR EOC review, and enrichment courses.

Instructional delivery of **initial credit** coursework will be offered in both the traditional face-to-face and virtual formats to allow maximum flexibility for students to advance through required coursework to provide them the option of taking additional courses during the regular school year and/or for early graduation.

Students who choose virtual learning will be required to complete a virtual learning readiness mini-course prior to beginning actual coursework for credit. A local educational mentor will be assigned to each student taking initial credit virtually to ensure success in the program. Pacing of online courses will be consistent with face-to-face courses with the exception of foreign language which will be available in an extended session through July 31. Students in virtual classes will begin coursework on site in a learning lab assisted by an educational mentor where they will demonstrate successful progress and earn the right to finish their learning, remotely.

Credit recovery courses required for graduation will be offered this summer in face-to-face and virtual delivery formats. Principal approval will be required in order for students who earned a grade less than 60 during the regular school year to be eligible to register for summer credit recovery. STAAR EOC review courses offered will include the STAAR EOC tested courses: Algebra I, Biology, English I, English II, and US History. Courses will be offered in a face-to-face setting, but available in virtual format for those who cannot attend summer school or who need accelerated instruction for more than two tests.

Enrichment courses to be offered (not for credit) include Career Explorations, SAT Prep, Study Skills for High School Success, and Texas Success Initiative Assessment (TSIA) Prep.

The high school summer program will consist of two six-day sessions during which students may earn up to one-half credit per session toward high school graduation. Students are expected to be in attendance 100% of the time and ALL absences and/or tardies must be approved in advance by the program manager. ALL absences, including those approved by the program manager, must be made up in order for students to earn credit.

We propose the following tuition rates for high school extended year courses:

o Initial credit \$60/half credit • Credit recovery \$60/half credit • EOC review

no charge -- no credit

o Enrichment

\$60 each -- no credit

No tuition refunds will be made after June 12, 2014.

We propose the following summer schedule for high school extended year programs:

- o Session I June 10-13, 16-17; 8:00 - 3:00
- June 18-19, 23-26, 8:00 3:00 Session II
- Virtual learning may extend through July 31

Graduation Recovery Program - 11th through 12th Grades

The graduation recovery program will be held at Pasadena Community School. Community School and will serve seniors who still need to graduate and need more than two (2) classes, and juniors who have no chance of graduating on time. Students are eligible for enrollment only via counselor recommendation and may enroll for up to 4 classes to earn 2 credits.

Students are expected to be in attendance 100% of the time and ALL absences and/or tardies must be approved in advance by the program manager. ALL absences, including those approved by the program manager, must be made up in order for a student to remain enrolled. There is a flat fee of \$60 for the summer program, regardless of the number of courses for which a student registers.

We propose the following summer schedule: Courses for credit: June 9 - 27; 8:30-3:55 (M-F)

Extended Year Programs – 5th through 8th Grades

5th and 6th grade students will attend SSI or retention summer school at one of two middle school campuses. 7th and 8th grade students will attend SSI or retention summer school at one of two intermediate campuses. Any student that is unsuccessful on the second administration of 5th or 8th grade Math or Reading STAAR will be required to attend summer school, at no cost to the student, to receive remediation for third administration of STAAR. Any student in 5th through 8th grade that fails one or more class will be required to attend summer school, at a cost of \$60 per class, to receive remediation and demonstrate mastery for promotion.

We propose the following summer schedule: One Session: June 9-25, 7:30 – 12:00 (M-Fri)

Extended Year Programs – K through 4th Grades

An extended year program will be provided for students in kindergarten through fourth grade who have not mastered the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills for their grade level. The extended year program will be held for twelve days. There will be four hours of instruction per day. To earn promotion the students must demonstrate satisfactory performance and be in attendance ninety percent of the time. Students will be served in ten cluster sites.

We propose the following summer schedule: One Session: June 9-26, 7:00 - 11:30 (M-Th)

Science Camp – 1st through 4th Grades

Each of the 11 Elementary Sites will also offer a science camp for first, second, third and fourth graders. This camp will have an integrated curriculum emphasizing math, reading and writing and is foundational for the fifth grade science program. There is no tuition charged for participation.

We propose the following summer schedule: One Session: June 9-26, 7:00 – 11:30 (M-Th)

Elementary Preschool Program

The district is required to offer Preschool programs for LEP (Limited English Proficient) students who will be in kindergarten or first grade in the Fall 2014. The program will operate for eight hours a day for fifteen days to fulfill the 120 hours of instruction requirement. The program is locally funded, although we do receive partial reimbursement from the state. The program will be held at three elementary cluster sites. There is no tuition charge for participation.

We propose the following summer schedule: One Session: June 9-27; 7:30 - 3:00 (M-F).

Migrant Program

The Migrant Summer Program will be provided at Pasadena High School. Students will participate in free distance learning courses with the University of Texas.

SUBJECT: Consideration and possible approval of GT Summer Camps for 2014

BACKGROUND: Pasadena ISD has successfully offered summer camps for identified gifted/talented students since 1995. With this continued success three Summer Exploration Camps are proposed for 2014.

Primary Camp (K-2), designed for identified G/T students currently in Kindergarten through 2nd grade, will enable students to learn about health and fitness across the disciplines of science, arts, movement, language arts and technology using an inquiry approach. Students will extend their investigation by exploring the characteristics of health and how it affects their bodies, minds and emotions. Students will create different products including recipes, menus, dances, while building and extending vocabulary. The camp will culminate in a showcase of learning.

June 11 -12, June 16-19, and June 23-26 8:15 a.m. – 11:45 a.m. Location – Young Elementary

Tuition would be set at \$70.00 per student \$100 out of district GT identified student (PISD employees only)

Elementary Camp (grades 3 & 4), designed for identified G/T students currently in the third and fourth grades, will enable students to learn about space through taking the unifying theme of space and developing skills for all content areas using an inquiry approach. Students extend their investigation by tackling concepts of astronomy, the structure of the solar system, and emerging technologies for space exploration. They will participate in a scientific investigation through designing and testing a rocket. The camp will culminate in a showcase of learning.

AVID takes a comprehensive approach that combines many components of studentcentered outreach programs with systemic curriculum improvement and professional development. BACKGROUND: In accordance with state bid laws, legal notices were published in the Houston Chronicle. In addition, RFP was also posted through E-Rate SLD 470 posting services.

> For E-Rate Year 17 (2014-2015), PISD has filed and received RFP responses for E-Rate eligible services applicable to district and based on the district approved technology plan. This process allows us the opportunity to file for E-Rate assistance and potentially save district substantial costs. Upon approval from E-Rate and notification of funding levels, PISD will evaluate local funding sources available for final decision.

> All bids have been reviewed and tabulated. Vendors have been selected according to documented evaluation criteria to provide best value to the district as they received the most number of points using the evaluation criteria.

> This RFP had four sections. Each section was described in the RFP to facilitate awarding each section separate.

Section 4.1 specifies the District's primary Internet connection. Our current contract expires June 30, 2014.

Section 4.2 specifies setting up District Internet 'hotspots' at five City Of Pasadena Community Centers, two Libraries and one YMCA. This would allow our students gathering places to get a District filtered Internet connection using their 1to1 devices and work on collaboration assignments.

- (b) San Jacinto Family YMCA
- (c) Golden Acres Recreation Center and surrounding recreation facilities

(d) O'Dell Harrison Recreation Center and surrounding recreation facilities

Section 4.3 specifies Internet Access at Home. This will help 'guarantee' our 1to1 students a good Internet connection at home using their 1to1 device. We feel this is essential in the long-term success of our 1to1 program. This project is planned in the existing PISD Technology Plan.

Section 4.4 specifies Community/Parent Technology Training. This is part of our 1to1 strategy to provide parents with some skills needed in the use of the Internet and 1to1 devices in order for the parent to help their children with homework and adopt a culture of being digitally connected through the Internet. We feel this is essential in the long-term success of our 1to1 program.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS: Section 4.1 – no award and no cost.

Section 4.2 – Phonoscope to install fiber at the eight community hotspots for a <u>Not To Exceed</u> one- time cost of \$169,939.

These cost are part of an E-Rate filing that will lower the District's final cost depending on the level of funding approved by E-Rate. The District's E-Rate approved cost would be an estimated \$27,190 one-time cost with an \$89.41 monthly maintenance cost.

All bids have been reviewed and tabulated. Vendors have been selected according to documented evaluation criteria to provide best value to the district as they received the most number of points using the evaluation criteria.

Our District's current Internet access contract of \$6,600/month for 400MB ends June 30, 2014.

This RFP, #14-035, will start a new three year Internet access contract, in accordance with E-Rate rules, for 3GB Internet bandwidth starting July 1, 2014.

This RFP also provides pricing for a secondary Internet connection. A secondary Internet connection allows for a backup connection in case the primary Internet connection is interrupted and for additional Internet bandwidth. The secondary Internet connection will be at an off-site commercial data-center.

There were no responses for Section 4.4.3.2 in the RFP #14-035.

PISD solicited Request for Quotes from DIR/Coop approved service providers within the area. The responses from the quotes were tabulated. Vendors have been selected according to documented evaluation criteria to provide best value to the district as they received the most number of points using the evaluation criteria.

Luminate responded to the Request for Quotes for

Section 4.4.3.2 to provide an Internet Service Rack and Power at a carrier neutral data facility.

These services and goods will support the district's 1to1, PLE, 24/7 learning and Disaster Recovery goals and objectives, This project will allow PISD to build the technology infrastructure to provide high capacity Internet, utilize cloud services when needed and build a disaster recovery program, and the opportunity to file for E-Rate and other funding assistance programs to potentially save substantial cost.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS: All services applied for will be covered through planned district budget funds and contingent on E-Rate funding approval. This process secures the opportunity to receive additional savings to district for these specific E-Rate eligible services.

Internet access thru Comcast for 3 GB (3000MB's) of Internet bandwidth. The monthly cost is \$5,958. The estimated E-Rate portion of \$5,123 will reduce our districts cost to an estimated \$835 monthly.

Cogent Communications for a secondary 3GB Internet connection. The estimated cost is \$2,250 per month. The estimated E-Rate portion of \$1,935 will reduce our districts estimated cost to \$315 monthly.

Luminate's estimated cost is \$25,176.00 for a two year contract with the options for an additional one year extension. - PUBLIC PROPERTY All District records, as defined, are declared to be the property of the District. No District official or employee has, by virtue of his or her position, any personal or property right to such records even though he or she may have developed or compiled them. The un-authorized destruction, removal from files, or use of such records is prohibited as provided in Local Government Code 201.005.

DOCUMENTThe District shall follow its records management program regarding
document destruction. However, the District shall preserve docu-
ments, including electronically stored information, and suspend
routine record destruction practices as applicable according to pro-
cedures developed by the records management officer:

- 1. In the event of pending or reasonably anticipated litigation;

Notification shall be given to appropriate staff of any applicable obligations to suspend routine record destruction practices.
